Objective(s):

Students will identify key people and events that were important in shaping Washington, DC. Students will identify key leaders in the struggle to extend equal rights to all Americans regardless of race.

Students will classify and sort objects into given categories.

Introduction:

- Teacher will review that February is Black History Month.
- "We've been talking about Martin Luther King and all that he did for the Civil Rights movement."
- Reference, read or briefly review MLK adapted story.
- "Today we are going to read a poem about MLK and then talk about ways we can celebrate Black History Month and MLK by spreading good and kindness."

Body:

- Teacher will read/have students read the poem aloud.
 - o Listen to song by Jack Johnson
 - o https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=mRjDBd6tBBY
- Have students paint their hands and stamp on poem paper.
 - o students who have composition goals should practice copying the poem.
- Clean up.
- Show students the graph and explain that they will be sorting the different scenarios between **good** things to do and **not good** things you can do with your hands.

Closing:

- Teacher will review the different things in each column.
 - o Count totals. Talk about which column has more, less, etc.
- "Martin Luther King did many good things with his own two hands. This month especially but all months we should always be 'doing good' and spreading kindness to others."


